CLASS I CORN (Hybrid Corn - 2007 OR 2008)

All hybrid corn varieties, and all seeds and grains must be of recommended varieties raised by the exhibitor, and must be entered and labeled according to the correct trace name and number by which they are sold. The number of days maturity "105 days," should indicate maturity and not a varietal name on corn. Recommended varieties are those recommended by Minnesota Crop Improvement Association and U of M Experiment Stations.
